AN IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY

Beautiful weather prevailed yesterday afternoon, which no doubt induced such a large number of residents to attend the unveiling of the Soldiers Memorial.

The Memorial is a very imposing piece of work and a credit to the contractor, Mr W. I. Neill, of Moonta It is of grey granite, and stands about 14st high. The centre stone is beautifully polished, and contains the names of the boys of the Franklin Harbour district, who sacrificed their lives for King and Country The names, which are arranged in alphabetical order, are as follows:—
