As briefly mentioned in a recent issue, there passed away at Katoomba on August 12 a respected resident of that centre in Mrs. Ada May Thompson, wife of Mr. T. H. Thompson, the sad news being received with very deep regret by old friends in this district, where the deceased spent the earlier portion of her life.

A native of Wilberforce, deceased was a member of the well-known Buttsworth family—a name prominently linked with the earlier history of the Hawkesbury. Some 24 years ago she was married, at Croydon, to Mr. Thompson, and for a time after their marriage they lived in the Wilberforce district.
