Dedication at Mullumbimby

MULLUMBIMBY, Tuesday.—St. Martin's Church of England was packed to capacity to accommodate the large crowd which attended the Anzac service followed by the dedication of the Memorial Gates.

The gates, which are a memorial to those who served and to those who made the supreme sacrifice in World War 2, were dedicated by the Bishop of Grafton (Right Rev. C. E. Storrs), who was also the preacher at the service in St. Martin's Memorial Church.

On the left hand pillar of the gates a brass plate carries the inscription, "To the Glory of God and a grateful tribute to all who served in World War 2, 1939-1945."

On the right hand pillar the names are listed of the 7 Church of England men who made the supreme sacrifice. The names are C. Booker, C. Freeman, K. Finch, V. Trench, T. Kendrick, A. Towers and N. Williams. Above the names is the inscription, "When you go home tell them of us and say, for their tomorrow we gave to-day."

In gold lettering on the gates is "War Memorial," Church of St. Martin's.

A combined service, at which the Presbyterians, Methodists and Salvation Army members participated, was held in the Memorial School of Arts. This service was also largely attended.
