

EIGHT MEMORIAL WINDOWS

Alberton Methodist Church

UNVEILING CEREMONY

What is claimed to be unique in the annals of church history in South Australia took place at the Alberton Methodist Church yesterday when eight handsome stained-glass memorial windows were unveiled by relatives of former members of the congregation.

The ceremony was performed in conjunction with the seventieth anniversary celebrations of the church. Three services attracted crowded congregations.

The windows, which bore texts, were decorated with handsome designs and were presented by members of the family of those commemorated. They were erected to the memory of Caroline and Sarah Simons and Gunner Percy Simons (unveiled by Mrs. Flavel), William and Annie Swan (by Mr. W. C. Swan), Hephzibah Beulah Channon (by Mr. J. W. Channon), Hilma Mary Symes (by Mr. J. Symes), John McKell (by Mr. J. McKell), and Mary Derry and Annie Richards (by Capt. Derry).

A fine triple window on the western wall was to the memory of Richard and Jane Remphrey. It depicted the Saviour with the lost sheep and was unveiled by Mrs. R. Bower (daughter).

"Lest we forget" and a cross standing against a background of threatening clouds was the design of the window erected to the memory of the fallen soldiers, which Mr. A. H. Scrymgour unveiled.

The church has been thoroughly renovated inside and out, and new drapings provided, while the adjoining hall has also been repainted. This work has been done at an expenditure of £500, and reflects much credit on Rev. D. J. Wellington and members of the church.

At the morning service Rev. W. H. Hanton delivered the address and Mr. Wellington called on the various church mem-

bering called on the various church members to unveil the windows. While they were doing so Mr. R. Webber (organist) rendered "For All Thy Saints Who From Their Labors Rest."

After the unveiling Mr. Wellington offered a prayer, and the service concluded with the anthem "For Ever With the Lord."

Preachers at the afternoon and evening services were Revs. J. G. Jenkin and D. Wellington respectively. Singing by the large choir led by Mr. George McKell as a feature of the celebration.

Oldest church member present was Mrs. E. Anderson, of Melbourne place, Alberton. Mr. John Dowsett, who was present as a boy at the laying of the foundation stone of the church in 1857, also attended.

Other old devotees were Mr. G. Davis, Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Tapp, and Mesdames J. Francis, R. Stanley, and S. Hosking.

Mr. John Bails, who was the first person to enter the church when it was declared open 70 years ago, was absent through ill-health. He and his wife, however, who lived next door to the church, were visited by scores of friends who had attended the services.
