

DALBY R.S.L. VIEW ON MEMORIAL CLOCK

The Dalby sub-branch of the R.S.S.A.I.L.A. is behind a movement to establish a memorial clock at the corner of Cunningham and Patrick streets, Dalby.

The matter was discussed at a meeting of the sub-branch held on Friday night.

The president (Mr. C. Keys) reported that on the previous Wednesday night representatives of a public committee had waited on some of the members of the sub-branch to explain what they had in view.

Mr. Keys said that it was proposed to provide a memorial clock, but the wishes of the sub-branch were being met by a decision not to include the names of the dead of World War I on the clock. In the discussion, it had been suggested that the public committee include in its objectives a decision to add a plaque with these names to the monument at Anzac Park.

Mr. Keys said that the representatives of the committee had made it clear that there would be no call on the sub-branch in any way in connection with the movement, as it was a public matter. He had welcomed this, and replied that it was a matter for the citizens of Dalby.

After discussion, it was decided: "That this sub-branch approves of a memorial clock being erected in Cunningham St., provided that no reference is made to the fallen of the Second World War, and that the names of the fallen be included on one of the plaques on the war memorial at Anzac Park, and it is suggested that it be named the War Memorial Clock."

Mr. Keys said that Mr. J. H. Shill had examined the position, and he had drawn up a plan whereby the plaque fronting the memorial park gates could be altered to include the names of the Second World War dead.

Mr. Shill produced the plan, and said that it would be a comparatively easy matter to make the alteration, and he would give any assistance possible.
