## Memorial Chapel to R.A.N. Fallen

A chapel to hold 480 people is to be built at Flinders Naval Depot as a memorial to Protestant R.A.N. officers and men killed in the first and second world WOPS.

laid by the Governor-General (Mr. McKell) at 3 p.m. on Saturday.

Cost of the chapel will be defrayed by public donations, including a bequest of £10,000 under the will of the late Mrs. A. M. K. Treacy, in memory of her husband, the late Paymaster-Captain Alfred Martin Treacy.

According to details issued by the navy yesterday, the chapel is to be of handsome Gothic design, erected according to a plan by Mr. Louis R. Williams, architect for the new Bathurst Cathedral.

Quarry-faced, autumn-tinted stone will be used; the root will be mellow-tinted tiles.

The design features a square tower 69 feet high surrounded.

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by a 20-foot flagpole.

Two windows of stained glass will adorn the lower portion of the tower.

At the base of the tower there will be a Rock of Re-membrance; on this will be a Book of Remembrance containing the names of all R.A.N. personnel who died in the two wars.

From a porch worshippers will step immediately into a nave 76 feet long. The floor will be of polished hardwood and the pews of limed hard-wood. The nave would be spanned with heavy wooden curved trusses, and an open. timbered roof.

Memorial windows from the present temporary wooden chapel wui be transferred to a new small chapel on the right of the nave near the sanctuary.

Accommodation for Naval Depot band will be pro-

vided in an orchestral gallery. The pulpit and lectern are to be made of carved wood or stone.

A naval spokesman said: "The lines of the memorial will provide a sense of augmented height; the color of the wood

The foundation stone will be height; the color of the wood and other furnishings, with light through the stained glass and memorial windows, impart an appropriate atmosphere of peace, reverence and dignity to the chapel mem-orial."
