

#### HONOR ROLL UNVEILED.

The honor roll at the Cavendish Presbyterian church was unveiled on Sunday at 3 p.m. by the moderator, the Rev. D. Macrae Stewart. There was a very large attendance, the church being crowded, a number of people having to stand outside at the door and around the open windows. There are 46 names on the honor board, ten of whom have made the supreme sacrifice. The moderator sympathized with the relatives of the fallen, and paid a special tribute to all Australian soldiers. He took for his text, "Things old and new," and preached a very eloquent and inspiring sermon. He also told a number of his experiences as chaplain with the boys at the front, and said he had always found our Australian boys to be honourable, chivalrous, and men to be proud of. The moderator impressed upon people who might find the returned soldier not quite what they expected to fear with them, and remember that our boys went away from Australia men in the truest sense of the

word, and that they had suffered considerably in health as the result of their very hard experiences. We must, he said, build them up again. The visit of the moderator was very much appreciated by all members and adherents of the church. The service began with singing the doxology, and suitable hymns were sung. The choir very ably rendered Simpson's anthem, "Break forth into joy," Mr. Arblaster taking the solo. The service closed with the singing of the National Anthem. Miss A. Forsyth officiated at the organ. The voluntary played during the offertory, "Dream thoughts," by Mr. E. R. Moss, deserves special mention, it being very favourably commented on by a number of the congregation. The Rev. C. Attwood thanked the Anglican church at Cavendish, who relinquished their usual service in favour of the unveiling ceremony. A special service of the Anglican church will be held at 3 p.m. on Sunday next. The evening service at the Cavendish Presbyterian church was well attended, and was conducted by the Rev. C. Attwood, who delivered a very impressive sermon. Suitable hymns were sung, and the choir, by special request, again rendered the anthem "Break forth into joy."
