

Sudden Death at Kirchheim.

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MR. H. HEINER.

Mr. Henry Heiner, sixty-five years of age, a farmer, of Kirchheim, near Marburg, died rather suddenly at his residence early on Sunday morning last. The body was subsequently examined by the Government Medical Officer (Dr. Von Losberg), who states that, in his opinion, death was due to apoplexy, brought about as a consequence of over-exertion. On Saturday Mr. Heiner was in town on business, and he then appeared to be in very good health. He left for home early in the afternoon, and on arrival there he set to work, and was busy till late at night, when he retired to his room. He rose on the next morning, and was engaging, as usual, in his devotions, and his wife, who was near by, saw his head fall forward on the box before which he was kneeling, and, on going over to him, she found that he had expired. We understand that the deceased had been subject to rather severe decaying rheumatism. He was a man who was well and favorably known throughout the district, and he will be greatly missed in the centre in which he resided. He was very industrious, and he took an active part in any movement having for its object the advancement of agricultural interests. For many years he was connected with the Wesleyan Church, and was a valuable local preacher on behalf of that body, expounding the Scriptures in either the German or the English language as occasion arose, Sunday after Sunday. He was also superintendent of the Sunday school at Kirchheim. Mr. Heiner leaves a widow and a family of nine children—four sons and five daughters. The funeral took place yesterday, and was largely attended. The cortege moved from the deceased's late residence at 10 o'clock, and the body was interred in the Walloon cemetery. The burial service was conducted by the Revs. Franck and Mellet, who were assisted by the Rev. R. Shaw.
