
CLEAR LAKE CHURCH ANNIVERSARY

Honor Board To Pioneers Unveiled



Amongst the names of these pioneers appear the late Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Edmonds-who later in 1904 presented the present church building on their golden wedding day-Mr. William Scott, Mr. John Scoble, Messrs, R. and K. McRae, and others, with the then missionary, Mr. John Lee.

To commemorate their memory and preserve a record for the future, an honor board on Sunday last was unveiled. This being the 70th nuniversary, it was fortunate that this ceremony could be performed by Mrs. M. A. Hobbs, who was present at the opening of the first church, and who was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Edmonds.

This board contains the following inscription; "To the Glory of God. and in memory of the Pioneers of this district, who, in 1878, first built a house to worship God-April, 1948.

After the unveiling Mrs. A. I., Wade, another daughter, publicly read the inscription. Mr. C. D. Hair, on behalf of the trustees, welcomed Mrs. Hobbs, of Horsham, Mrs. Wade, of Natimuk, Mr. E. A. Edmonds and Mrs. B. M. Hair, of Geelong, and Mrs. F. Watson and Messrs, G. and C. Edmonds, who are all the survivors of that pioneer Edmonds family, in addition to a great grand-daughter, Miss B. Edmonds, of Geelong. Also present and welcomed were Mrs. R. H. Sinclair, of Nurrabiel, and Mr. T. Scott, of the family of the late Mr. W. Scott.

The speaker then addressed words of welcome to the Rev. A. Vincer, of Melbourne, who was in charge of the auniversary services, and reminded the congregation that in 1914, just on the outbreak of Word War 1, Mr. Vincer arrived in Australia, fresh from Cliff College, London, having offered himself to the Methodist Church of Australia.
