## CERES MEMORIAL GATES

## Unveiled by Acting Premier

#### Handsome Tribute to Pioneers and Men of A.I.F.

Erected as a tribute to pioneers of the district as well as soldiers who fought in the Great War, memorial gates at the entrance to the recreation reserve, Ceres, were unveiled by the Acting Premier (Mr. Old), and formally handed over to the frustees of the reserve, before a large gathering yesterday afternoon. The money to creat the memorial had been raised by donations, and the proceeds of efforts during the past 15 years, and the gates are free of debt.

The memorial is a handsome of the two gates are of from with stone pillars on either side. One pillar has the inscription: "Erected 1927 as a tribute to the ploneers of the district," and the other: "In memory of the soldiers who fought in the Great War, 1914-1918."

Following a reading from the Scripture by the Rev. Stanley Humphrey and a prayer by the Rev. H. G. Matthews, the president of the shire (Cr. J. W. White) welcomed the Acting Fremier.

Cr. White said the township was appropriately named Ceres, after the Grecian goddess of agriculture. For miles, said the speaker, one saw agricultural land of which they might be proud. It was a unique occasion for Ceres to have the Acting Premier in the district for the sole purpose of attending a function there. They welcomed Mr. Old, and felt honored by his attendance.

The Acting Premier traced the growth of the pastoral occupation of the inned from the time stock was first landed at Gelilbrand in November, 1835, and said there was a story-that William Buckley, "the wild white man, claimed to own the Barraboot Hills, they having been presented to him by the Gectong tribe of blacks. Impressed by William Robertson, Buckley gave him the Barrabool Hills, and the very early settlers respected this gift, and for a time grazed their stock on the hills only with the consent of Robertson. With the discovery of gold the Barrabool farmers reaped an even greater golden harvest than the diggers.

## A Lasting Tribute

Mr. Old said that the gathering was honoring the pioneers and the soldiers. The pioneers had made something of the land and the soldiers had fought to maintain it, and it was fitting that the two memorials should be associated. He had pleasure in unveiling the memorial gates and handing them to the trustees as a lasting tribute to the memory of the pioneers and returned soldiers.

The chairman of the trustees of the recreation reserve (Mr. S. H. McCann) acknowledged the handing over of the gates, and said that the great heritage of which they were all so proud had not come by accident. It had been only through great service and sacrifice. Any great service could not be given without sacrifice. The pioneers had built on firm foundations, and the third generation of Australian born was living on the farms the pioneers started. The recreation ground had been started 25 years ago, and the trustees had never had a "cent" from the Government.




