

Tammin Honours Anzacs

A combined Anzac Day Service was held on Sunday in the Hall at 11 a.m., the Rev. R. Pym, assisted by the Rev. Elms, officiating.

Among the very large crowd were many visitors, especially ex-servicemen from Doodlakine, Kellerberrin, Cunderdin and Yorkrakine.

After the solemn, but stirring Service the congregation moved from the hall to the Memorial Gates.

The Gates were erected by the citizens of the town and district in Memory of those who served in the last World War.

Mr. R. B. Nottage, President of the Tammin R.S.L. welcomed the visitors and gave a short address explaining how the gates were erected and thanked those responsible for such a fine Memorial, especially the Secretary of the Welcome Home Committee, Mr. A. Christison, and the Secretary of the Cunderdin Road Board, Mr. MacPherson, who supervised the work.

The Welcome Home Committee who sponsored the erection of the Memorial have handed to the local Branch of the R.S.L. the Wardenship of the gates, and the Road Board has laid

apart the plot of ground at the rear of the gates for the purpose of a Park. This park is to be

of a Park. This park is to be known as the "Memorial Park."

Then followed an address by Mr. G. M. Cornell M.L.A., after which Mr. C. Latham, M.L.C. and President of the York R.S.L. was called upon to officially open the gates. Mr. Latham impressed on the people to preserve and care for the park, he said the Gates were an unusual Memorial and congratulated the residents of the district on the success of their effort.

Mr. Latham went on to suggest that the local School Master bring the children down to the Park once a year and explain why the Memorial and Park were there and tell the story of Anzac. The day suggested was Empire Day.

Mr. Pym then performed the Dedication Ceremony. A wreath was laid at the foot of the Memorial. Mr. Latham unveiled the gates and declared them open.

The Last Post and Revillie were sounded by the Buglars.
