


Normanville caravan park officially opened

The Normanville Beach Caravan Park was opened in an unveiling ceremony by member for Alexandra, Mr Ted Chapman on Sunday.

Extensions to the caravan park, which took over 12 months, were completed in August at a cost of \$900,000.

The project was funded by the Department of Tourism, the District Council of Yankalilla and Community Employment Scheme.

Mr Chapman said the extensions were an investment to ratepayers, not a cost.

"The rural and tourist industries can comfortably live with one another," he said.

"Council must be careful that one, the rural, doesn't supplement the other at the ratepayers expense."

Chairman of the District Council, Mr Peter Krichauff, said more caravan facilities had been needed in the area for over ten years.

A footbridge in the caravan park was officially named after the Butterworth family, a pioneer family of the district.
