

LATE DR. MACCARTHY. BURIAL AT WAVERLEY.

The funeral of the late Dr. Charles William MacCarthy, from St. Mary's Cathedral to the Waverley Cemetery yesterday afternoon, was largely attended.

At the conclusion of the 9 o'clock In Memoriam Mass, Archbishop Kelly paid a tribute to the gifted Irishman, who had spent so many years of his life in Sydney. Before the removal of the coffin, which was covered with flowers, the cathedral organist played Chopin's Funeral March. The route to Waverley was so arranged that the funeral passed St. Vincent's Hospital, Darlinghurst. As a tribute to the oldest member of the medical staff, all the nurses who were not on duty stood in front of the general hospital, the private hospital, and the Hospice for the Dying.

Mr. P. J. MacCarthy (brother), Mrs. A. Arland O'Hara (daughter), Miss Peggy MacCarthy (niece), Miss Maggie MacCarthy (cousin), and Messrs. Joseph and Anthony MacCarthy (nephews) were the principal mourners. Dr. A. Arland O'Hara (son-in-law), who was unable to attend, sent a wreath.

St. Vincent's Hospital, conducted by the Sisters of Charity, with which the deceased had been associated since 1885, was represented by Dr. R. Scott-Skirving, Dr. M. O'Gorman Hughes, and Dr. Charles H. Maher. Lewisham Hospital was represented by Dr. Flynn. Among the other members of the medical profession were Dr. Nash, M.L.C., Dr. Marano (Consul for Italy), Dr. Veech, Dr. A. J. Flanagan, Dr. L. Kesteven, and Dr. Macdonnell Kelly. Mr. A. Vider represented the Mater Misericordiae Hospital, and Mr. Pierce M'Enroe St. Margaret's Hospital. Many officers and members of the A.H.C. Guild, Hibernian, Australasian Catholic Benefit Society, Irish National Foresters, and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul attended the funeral.

The burial prayers of the Roman Catholic Church were said by the Rev. J. O'Gorman, the Very Rev. P. B. Kennedy assisting, close

to the elaborate marble monument which was erected to the memory of Irish patriots who fell during the rebellion of 1798. As a special mark of honour, it is proposed to remove the remains of Dr. MacCarthy from their present resting place to the "Ninety-Eight Memorial," all the decorative panels of which, and the medallions as well, were designed by him.
