"I am particularly pleased to perform this ceremony in honor of a man who did so much for the State and who was, in fact, the father of self-government in South Am-icalia

"Realising the drawbacks of penal settlement and the sence of systematic effort colonisation in the at colonisation in the grants of large areas of landed estates, Wakefield proposed to encourage settlement by the sale of land in small freehold blocks at sufficient price to provide funds to finance the immigration of free settlers and laborers," His Excellency

"These views he expounded in his 'Letter from Sydney,' published while in prison there in 1829.

"It is clear that we owe to Edward Gibbon Wake-field a debt of gratitude for the State in which we live and the self-govern-ment we now proudly en-

The Governor said that besides formulating the plan to colonise SA, Wakefield to colonise SA. Wakefield was the prime mover in 1837 for the settlement of New Zealand.

His Excellency paid a tri-bute to Mr. George Mor-phett, president of the Pio-neers' Association, who had worked enthusiastically to-wards creating a permanent Wakefield memorial, and to Mr. Harold Pinnis of the Royal Geographical Society. Both had done much to per-petuate the memory of our pioneers, he said.
