MR. HENRY GREEN.

MR. HENRY GREEN. The death occurred at his residence, Guys-cliff, Carier-street, North Sydney, of Mr. Henry Green, who was prominent in the building trade on the North Shore, and also for nearly 30 years was a member of the North Sydney Council. He was 70 years of age. Mr. Green was born in Warwickshire, Eng-land, and came to Australia at the age of 21 years. He was a bricklayer, and worked at that trade for several years. He later engaged in the building trade, and continued to progress, until he possessed extensive in-terests, particularly on the North Shore. Mr. Green had resided in North Sydney for about 42 years, and always took a keen interest in any movement having for its object the ad-vancement of the district. He was elected to the North Sydney Council in 1996, and with the exception of a few months in 1913 sat continuously until the time of his death. He was Mayor of the municipality in 1922. An active worker in all movements during the war, he was a member of the North Sydney Repatriation Committee, and a trustee of the North Sydney War Memorial. Mr. Green was associated with a number of companies, and was renaging director of the Northern Sub-urbs Cc-operative Brick Company. Mr. Green has left a widow, six sons, and two daughters. Another son was killed at the war.

the war. The funeral took place on Saturday after-noon in the Methodist portion of the Gore Hill Cemetery. There was a large gathering at the graveside, the service being conducted by the Rev. J. Sweetnam Thomas, of the Walker-street, Methodist Church.
