THE WORONORA CEMETERY.

The new constary which has been opened at Woronora, close to the Sutherland station, on the Illawarra line, is probably the most systematically-planned burial ground in the colonies, and when the usual improvements and cultivation have been effected the cometery spicturesqueness, aided by the natural surroundings of the National Park, will bear a very impressive completoness. For many years the residents of the southern suburbs sgitated zealously for a grant of land for cemetery purposes, and as the once sparse population began to rapidly swell the small provision which had been made by some of the Churches was not only inadequate, but the burials became objectionable to the community for sanitary and other reasons. Eventually the Lands Department decided to grant a portion of the National Park for the purpose advocated, and in the beginning of last April dedicated 112; acres as a general cometery under section 104 of Crown Lands Act of 1884. The allottment to the various denominations was made as follows:—Church of England, 28a. 2r. 3p.; Roman Catholic, 19a. 0r. 8p.; Wesleyan Methodist, 10a. 1r. 20p.; Presbyterian, 7a. 3r. 25p.; Congregational, 3a. 0r. 25p.; Primitive Methodist, 2a. 3r. 7p.; unsectarian portion, 2a. 3r. 7p.; Baptist, 2a. 0r. 7p.; Jews, 1a. 0r. 25p.; Lutheran, 1a. 0r. 25p. An area of 32a. 0r. 33p. is set apart for a custodian's residence, plantations, readway, and a mortuary station, and 2r. 39p. is reserved as a site for a lodge. The space per grave is fixed at 3ft. by 8ft., and as it is estimated that about 1000 can be provided for per acre the burial accommodation of the emetery, after allowing for the reservations for border plantations, readways, &c., will approximate 79,600 graves. Each denomination is represented by one frustoe, and there are two trustees for the unsectarian pertion, making a total of 11 persons, who acres as econhined trust for the whole area. This system of trusteeship is a departure from that hitherto adepted. For the Necropolis and most other cemeters, after allowing cases of churchyard burial, the residents have bitherto had to bring their dead into the Redfern station, and then have the bodies conveyed to Rockwood or Waverley for interment. The Government granted a sum of £1000 for expenditure on improvements to the new cometery, and that amount has been expended on having the burial ground forced in and cleared, the main read or drive made, trees planted near the fences, and the different sections had out and pegged. The only difficulty in the way of the trustees now is the requirement of a railway siding into the cometery. A survey for this purpose was made by the Railway Department, but as no money was voted for the work nothing further has been done. The cemetery has now been opened about three months, and between 20 and 30 burials have taken place.
