A crash was heard, and when his family rushed in they found him lying unconscious on the floor, his death occurring in a few moments.

"Jack," as he was known to practically every man, woman, and child in the district, was one of the most popular recidents. What endeared him most to everyone was the fact that he met, both misfortune and streaks of good luck with the same cheeriness. His happy smile and splendid manner endeared him to everyone, and his death removes one of the most popular men of the locality.

He enlisted for the war, and though he did not get overseas he became a great worker on behalf of the diggers. Not only for them was his great heartedness displayed, for there are hundreds of "lame dogs" whom he has helped over the stile, doing good deeds and blushing to find them known he has believe and blushing to find them

Some years ago deceased started a business in Trundle, where he opened with his brother, Mr. T. C. Medlyn, as a stock and station agent. They built up one of the finest businesses of this nature in the west; but on the death of his father Mr. T. C. Medlyn assumed control of the Cambridge Hotel at Parkes and deceased carried on the Trundle business.

After a service at the Church of England this morning, conducted by the Ven. Archdeacon Neild, who
