

Unveiling Roll of Honor at Sunny Brae.

At the Sunny Brae school house on Tuesday night last, a roll of honor was unveiled by the Mayor of Peterborough (Mr. S. D. Jones). About 150 persons were present from all parts of the district. The chairman of the committee (Mr. M. Liddy) presided. A musical programme was submitted by Misses Simon, Malycha (2), and Dowd, and Messrs. Malycha, Clapp, O'Leary, Blunsden, and Johnson. The chairman in asking the Mayor to unveil the roll of honor remarked that 31 old scholars of the school had enlisted; a farewell had been extended to 15, the remainder being out of the district. The Mayor referred to the history of the great war and congratulated the residents on the fine response that 31 old scholars had given their services for King and Country. Twenty-seven had returned, and he was pleased to see so many of them present that night. Four of the men had paid the supreme sacrifice—Privates H. and M. Critchley, J. Clapp, and G. Crowhurst. The Mayor then unveiled the roll, and read the names inscribed thereon—Nurse K. W. Liddy, Lieut. J. O. Critchley, Pte. G. Lawson, Pte. M. Critchley, Pte. S. Harvey, Trp. C. Norton, Pte. D. Duggan, Pte. A. Pohner, Pte. J. Maddigan, Pte. G. Simon, L.-Cpl. G. Prior, L.Cpl. A. Prior, Pte. C. Clapp, Pte. J. Clapp, Pte. T. Haworth, Pte. G. W. Crowhurst, Cpl. H. Critchley, Pte. A. Bailey, Pte. A. Perkins, Pte. F. Pohner, Pte. G. Woods, Pte. C. Woods, Pte. T. Durick, Pte. W. Durick, Pte. C. Pohner, Petty-Officer A. T. Thomas, Pte. A. Stratford, Pte. J. Stratford, Pte. E. Markey, Pte. A. Patterson, and Pte. H. McPherson. The audience rose and sang the National Anthem. The Mayor then presented gold medals, suitably inscribed, to the following—Lieut. J. O. Critchley, Ptes. T. Haworth, C. Clapp, T. Durick, H. Clapp, A. Stratford and W. Durick and also medals to the relatives of those four killed in action. The Mayor spoke words of appreciation to each, and the Mayoress pinned the medals on their breasts and also congratulated

each soldier and to the relatives of the departed ones, feelingly referred to their great efforts. The roll of honor is of solid brass, and each name is on a brass plate. It is a beautiful work of art, and came from the establishment of Messrs. Burmeisters, of Adelaide. Mrs. F. Simons and Mr. Fletcher also spoke and thanked the Mayor and Mayoress for coming out and unveiling the roll. The Mayor, in response, said that it was a great privilege, and that he and the Mayoress were only too pleased to oblige the residents and show their appreciation to the men who had gone forth, and to the residents of the district also, for their welfare of the men.

The hall was beautifully decorated with flags, and Mr. Liddy and his committee are to be congratulated on the great success of the fixture. Lieut. J. O. Critchley suitably replied for the returned soldiers, and remarked that he and his comrades felt indebted to the Sunny Brae committee. Supper was provided by the ladies, after which a dance was held.
