


Dr. John Marden, M.A., LL.D., who for very many years had directed, with conspicuous success, the educational and administrative affairs of the girls' colleges associated with the Presbyterian Church, and who was well-known throughout the State as the Principal of the Presbyterian Ladies' colleges at Croy-den and at Pumble died vesteriar in a private don and at Pymble, died yesterday in a private hospital at Randwick, at the age of 69 years. He had been ill for about six weeks.

A man of distinguished scholarship, of high and inspiring ideals, and of unsparing energy, Dr. Marden had won for himself a distinctive place among those charged with the intel-lectual guidance of young people. A pro-gressive educationalist, Dr. Marden did much to establish at the Presbyterian Ladies' Colleges at Craydon and at Pymble those splen-did traditions and high ideals which they have preserved and always kept before them.



Dr. Marden was born in Victoria and was educated at Geelong College, and later at the universities of Melbourne and Sydney. It was as a young man that he studied for the law and took his degrees, afterwards devoting himself to education. He was best known as the Principal, for about 30 years, of the Presbyterian Ladies' College at Croyof the Presbyterian Ladies' College at Croy-don, and as the founder and Principal of the Presbyterian Ladies' College at Pymble. The work of those institutions and their develop-ment, he directed with conspicuous ability and success, and the thousands of pupils who exceived their training under his multiple and success, and the thousands of pupils who ceceived their training under his guidance, and whose characters and lives were influenced by his personality and teaching, held him in very affectionate regard.
