A verse of the National Anthem was sung, followed by silent prayer, after which Mr. Doig pronounced the benediction.

During the service the music was needy rendered by the combined choirs, the hymns including, "O God, Our Help," "Fight the Good Fight," and "For all the Saints," During the offeriory Mrs Gresham sang a solo. Miss Thomson was organist.
