DEATH OF FATHER CORRIGAN

NOTED CLERIC
Father Phillip Corrigan, the oldest
priest in the Archdioceae of Brisbane,
died yesterday morning at St. Ita's
Presbytery, Gladatone Road, Dutton Park.

Pather Corrigan, who was in his

eightieth year, in 1879 from Carlow College, Ire-iand, where he studied and was ordained: After a few years in Bris-bane and Ipswich he was sent to Charleville, and in the far west old-timers still atill sing a song with a rare old lilt, and the opening words go thus:



Late Father Corrigan

When Father Corrigan first went West.

He took to the West a thrill: For was he not champion in every aport

All round about Charleville?

There are nine other stanzas, telling of the veteran priest's ability in the manly art of boxing, how well he could dance a jig, and how he downed the heftiest wrestlers the shearing cheeks could provide

the heftiest wrestlers the shearing sheds could produce. Some years later Father Corrigan returned to Brisbane, and did a great deal of valuable work in the churches and schools of Brisbane. Por the last nineteen years his home has been St. Ita's Church and school at Dutton Park. He remained throughout one of the most loved members of priesthood—an outstanding cleric.

The funeral will take place to-morrow at Nudgee, after Solemn Requiem Mass at St. Stephen's Cathedral at 10 o'clock.
