

**CARDIFF.**

The Methodist Church was crowded on Sunday afternoon to witness the unveiling of the roll of honour. The ceremony was performed by Major-chaplain W. Dains, who stated he was pleased to have the honour of unveiling the tablet belonging to one of the most patriotic Hulse towns in the State. He spoke of the large number of men who enlisted from Cardiff and offered their lives in the cause of freedom. From the commencement to the end of the campaign they fought with a strong determination to win, and beat the enemy, yet a kinder soldier than the Australian could not be found. He spoke of an incident which happened at the battle of Pozieres. The Australians took a number of German prisoners, amongst whom was a well-educated German officer who spoke English fluently. This officer referred to the dauntless bravery of Australian soldiers, who knew no fear. They were fierce fighters, but yet kind to the German wounded. In drawing the Union Jack aside, Captain Dains unveiled a handsome marble tablet, bearing the following inscription and names:—  
 "Our heroes. The great war, 1914-1918."
