## OPENING OF DOWNLANDS.

Described by Bishop Byrne as "another link in the chain of culture and refinement in Toowoomba." the Downlands Secondary College, the first institution of its kind to be established in Australia by the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, was blessed and officially opened by the Bishop of Toowoomba (Dr. Byrne) to-day, in the presence of a large gathering. Monsignor M'Kenna (vicar-general of the diocese), who presided, extended a cordial welcome to the sacred Fathers and their international order of edu-cation. He pointed out that although, Downlands was the first public school of its kind that the order had estab-lished in Australia, they had similar in-stitutions in other countries, which had done wonderful work for the church.
