
To Fallen Soldiers

Mt. Lawley Memorial.

The unveiling ceremony of the Mt. Lawley Inglewood Fallen Soldiers' Memorial was performed on Sunday last by the Governor (accompanied one, and the order of service most impressive, the Archbishop dedicating the imposing structure.

The attendance was a very large one, and the order of service most appropriate. The 28th Battalion Band (under Sgt. L. M. Price) was in attendance, and Miss Winnie Broadley was in charge of a juvenile choir from the Mt. Lawley School.

Capt. G. K. Ryder commanded the guard of honour drawn from Headquarters Company of the 28th Battalion, with colors. The Boy Scouts were in charge of Scoutmaster Holland.

The Governor was welcomed to the district by Mr. E. W. Hamer (as chairman of the Perth Roads Board), and Mr. J. Orr (the memorial committee chairman) voiced the opinion of his committee when he remarked "Proud and satisfied, we stand beside our completed work.

After the unveiling the "Last Post" was sounded by Sgt. R. Morgan and during the playing of the Dead March wreaths were deposited on the base of the Memorial by those present, that from the committee, the work of Mrs. Alexander, being composed of poppies, intertwined with ivy, and bearing the words, "Lest we Forget."

The speakers included Messrs. R. T. Robinson, K.C., and McCallum Smith M.L.A.

Erected at a cost of approximately £3000 the Memorial reflects the greatest credit on the design of Messrs. Eales and Cohen (the architects) and the contractors (Messrs. Wales and Gillies).
