UNVEILING OF JOSEPH FURPHY MEMORIAL.

The unveiling of a bronze tablit in memory of Joseph Furphy (Tom' Collins), author of "Such is Life." "Rigby's Romance," and a collection of poems, took place in the Yarra Glen school on Saturday last when, in addition to about 150 local residents, 100 relatives, friends and admirers of Furphy's work attended, many coming from distant parts of the State. The Furphy family was represented by Mrs. Stewarf inister of Joseph Furphy and the only surviving member of the family), Mesdames Bryden, Cracknell, Pescott Jackson and Mise Vera Stewart (nieces), Mrs. Murphy and Mrs. Hepbern (grand nieces), Mr. Harry Furphy (nophew), and Messrs, A. W. and W. R. Furphy (sons of Mr. Ross Furphy, who was a nephew of John Furphy).

The tablet, slendidly executed by Mr. Wallace Anderson, of Surrey Hills, was the result of the efforts of Miss Kate Baker, a friend of the author, and at one timer a State school teacher. During the past four months she has been energetically working with Mr. Pascoe, the head teacher of the Yarra Glen school, in an endeavor to establish the fact that Joseph Furphy was born at Yarra Glen in 1843, his father's house standing on the exact spot where the school now stands. Joseph Furphy's letter to his mother, written in 1889 when he re-visited Yarra Glen, firmly establishes that

Some time ago a splendid committee of Yarra Glen residents was formed, appointing Mr. J. W. Lawrey president and Mr. Pascoe secretary, and the co-operation of all concerned resulted in the fulfilment of Miss Baker's great desire to have the memorial erected. Much publicity had been given to the movement by the Sydney "Bulletin" and Mrs. Nellle Palmer, of Kalorama, It is interesting to hote that the Henry Lawson Society (Mr. A. J. Suillvan), the Lindsay Gordon Society (Mrs. G. Hunter vice-president, and Mr. J. K. Moir) and the Victorian Historical Society (Messrs, G. Byrne and J. K. Moir) were represented.

After the singing of the National Anthem Nellie Darby, a small girl of the school, presented bouquets to Mrs. Stewart, Miss Baker and Mrs. Palmer.

Mr. Lawrey, the president, in his opening address expressed pleasure at seeing such a large attendance, and referred to the Furphy family being so splendidly represented, all having come to do honor to one of Australia's writers.

Mr. James McRae, Director of Education, who next addressed the matherine dwell upon the signifiEducation, who next addressed the gathering, dwelt upon the significance of the fact that the tablet should be placed in the school, where all who passed through it in years to come would learn some of Purphy's history and be taught to appreciate the sentiment of Australian writers. Although Furphy's books were not so well known as they might be, there was a time coming when Australian literary men and women would be more honored for their contributions to literature. His concluding remarks referred to one of Furphy's poems, "The School House on the Plain," which he recited to the assembly.
