WAR MEMORIAL TREES.

Arbor Day was celebrated on Wednesday by the planting of an avenue of cupressus herizontalia along the Queenschiff-Point Lensdale road. In all 50 trees were planted in honor of our brave lads. Most of the holes were prepared by the senior boys of the local State school, supervised by the Mayor and the town clerk. About 3 p.m., the Mayor, Cr. W. J. Thwaites, briefly adgressed the assemblage and reminded his auditors that the trees were to be planted in memory of the dear boys who had of-fered their lives on the field of battle. He thought that the best way to perpetuate their memory was to plant beautiful trees to remind them of the beautiful spirit displayed by the worthy sons of a worthy Empire, and who offered themselves to defend the glorious principles and traditions of Great Britain. Of the 50 trees planted, 45 were in honor of the boys who will never come back. These trees will serve as monuments, and as people looked at them in the days to come, their hearts will be pro-foundly stirred. Many of these trees were donated by residents, and the Mayor made no sppeal to the public to supply others, as he was desirous that each one of the 500 Queenscliff volunteers should be represented by a tree.
