NEI Representative Unveils Commemorative Tablet

TABLET commemorating the 300th anniversary of the discovery of Tasmania by Abel Tasman was unveiled by Dr J. C. van Hoogstraten, Chief Commissioner for the Netherlands East Indies in Australia, at the Royal Hobart Regatta on Saturday.
