A FINE MEMORIAL WINDOW.

The memory of the good work done by the late Pte. Carl Schrader as a member of St. Theodore's Anglican Church, Rose Park, will be perpetuated by a memorial window, which was unveiled in the church on Sunday afternoon. The deceased solon Sunday atternoon. The deceased sol-dier, who was 20 years of age, was a son of Mr. C. H. E. Schrader, of Kensington road, Rose Park, and was killed in action on the Gallipoli Peninsula on November 20 last year. From boyhood he was closely identified with St. Theodore's Church, and worked his way up through the various worked his way up through the various offices to the Secretary of the Catechism, which position he held at the time of his departure for the front. He was greatly departure for the front. He was greatly loved by the children of the church, and made a practice of writing long letters to them describing has life and experiences on active service. The memorial window, which has been placed in the baptistry of the church, represents a token of loving regard for the late Pte. Schrader's rela-tives and friends, including the children among whom he worked. The subject of the window is that of a crusader, the figure being picked out in beautiful and harmoniously blending coloured glass. The unveiling ceremony was performed by Mr. Adolph Schrader, a brother of the de-ceased, after which the Rev. F. H. King (rector of the church) dedicated the window. He drew lessons from the life of the late Pte. Schrader, which was that of a true Christian coldier. A large congregation witnessed the ceremony, and appropriate hymns were sung.
