The funeral of the late Michael Clarke, first-class constable in the N.S.W. Mrs. Blow. Mrs. Redmond, Misses Ward, and Dorrie and Miss Redmond. The coffin was borne to the hearse by the tallest comrades of deceased. The procession was headed by the Eand, conducted by Constable Mankey, and one hundred police in uniform walked in front of the hearse, which was followed by a I ne of vehicles, which extended along Pitt street from Liverpool-street to Campbellstreet.
