McCarthy; No. 10, by H. Price to J. McInnes; No. 11, by A. Cameron to C. Ellice; No. 12, by Mrs. G. McDonald to W. Turnbull; No. 13, by J. Clarke to J. Lewis. After the ceremony of tree planting was over Mr. Loder addressed a few appropriate remarks. Apologies were received from Dr. Goldsmid and Rev. Brown, also Mr. G. Mann, and Mr. G. McDonald.
