## Dedication of Window and Gateway.

TO MEMORY OF LATE MRS. E. M. HIGGINS.

## IMPRESSIVE SERVICE IN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

A beautiful stained glass window, the gift of the family, and a handsome stone and iron gateway erected by the congregation were dedicated to the glory of God, and in memory of the late Mrs. Elizabeth McWhae Higgins at an impressive service in St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, Gloucester, on Sunday afternoon.

The dedication was arranged to coincide as near as possible with the first anniversary of the death of Mrs. Higgins.

There was a large gathering around the gateway outside the Church when the service of dedication commenced at 2 o'clock, with the reading of the Invocation by the Rev. H. A. Shaw. The congregation hang the 100th Pailm. "All People That on Earth Do Deveil."

During the Narrative the Rev. Shaw paid a glowing tribute to the great service rendered the Church nd the community by the late Mrs. Higgins. I'm explained that the dedication service was arranged to coincide with the first anniversity of the death of Mrs. Higgins, which occurred on the 20th August last year. He said be was very sorry that he did not know more of her before her death. He now knew great deal more of her than he did when he presided at the funeral cryice. He was sure, said Mr. Shaw, that the late Mrs. Higgins wou d have been delighted with our choice. It was a beautiful tyle of memorial. When members of the congregation and strangers passed through the gateway into the House of God they would re-member the late Mrs. Higgins. Many times Mrs. Higgins had passed through the side gate into the church and he felt she was there in spirit that day. They had had a struggle getting the gateway finished in time and ready for that day. There had been the difficulty of labour and materials to contend with It was his privilege, said Mr. Shaw, to call upon the gathering to

Shaw, to call upon the gathering to enter the gateway. The work on the gateway was not quite finished yet. It was proposed to have a tablet there explaining the Higgins' Memorial Gateway.

Mr. Shaw then called upon Mrs. F. N. Lairie, the oldest member of the congregation, who had come here over 50 years ago to open the cate.

Following a short prayer, Mrs. Laurie opened the gate and entered the church. The procession into the church then began, headed by members of the Higgins' family. There followed the Choir, Members of Session, the Elders and their wives, the Committee of Management and their wives and members of the congregation and friends. The church was packed.

The church service for the dedication of the memorial window began with the singing of paraphrase 66. How Bright these Glorious Spirit Shine.

The presentation and acceptance of the window then began. The unveiling of the Higgins' Memorial Window was done by the daughter of the late Mrs. Higgins, Mrs. Elsie Thomas. As the representative of the family, Mr. Herbert Higgins, asked Mr. Shaw, as the Minister of the Clurch, to receive the window from members of the Higgins' family in memory of their mother, in her herbert and to the glory of God.

As the drapings fell aside a stained glass window of great beauty was revealed. The window has been placed high in front of the church facing the congregation and the light from the westering aim diffused the many rich colours in the glass, giving it a glorious aspect to those who gazed upon it in admiration and reverence. A light has been placed over it outside the church to show up the beautiful colouring at night. The window depicts in deep purple, red, blue and green stainings, the Divine Sower, Christ, sowing the seeds of the Kingdom.

The acceptance was undertaken by the Rev Shaw. He said: I accept this gift as a sacred trust in bonour of the faithful and Christian discipleship of her in honour of

whore memory it is creeted. He added: I now accept this memorial dedicated to the glory of God in memory of His servant, Elizabeth McWine Higgins, who passed to the glory of God on 20th August, 1946.

Mr. Shaw then accepted the gift of the memorial window on behalf of the congregation.

Mr. Show concluded this part of the service with a prayer of dedicution.

Following the frayer Mrs. Shaw sang the hallowed hymn, "Abide W.t. Mc."

The scripture reading by Mr. Shaw was taken from the parable of the sower (Mark 4:3-8). The choir sang the anthem, "What Are

choir sang the anthem, "What Are These Arrayed in White Robes?"

The theme of a significant address given by Mr. Shaw was "Light is Sowed for the Righteous." In it he enlarged on the story depicted by the window, of Christ sowing the seeds of His Kingdom. He made reference to the many "good seeds" sowed by the late Mrs. Higgins during her lifetime.

The congregation joined in the Lord's Prayer, Before the benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Shaw the appropriate hymn, "For all the Saints who from their Labours Rest," was sung.

Mrs. G. McGregor presided at the organ.
